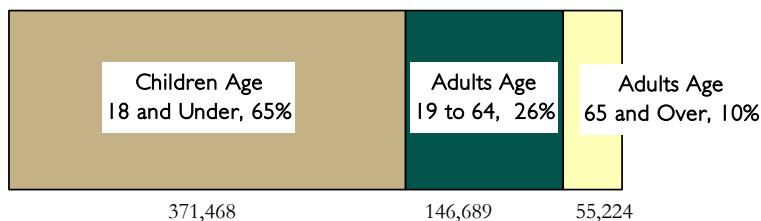

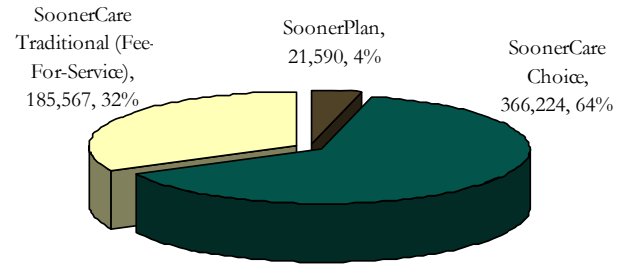

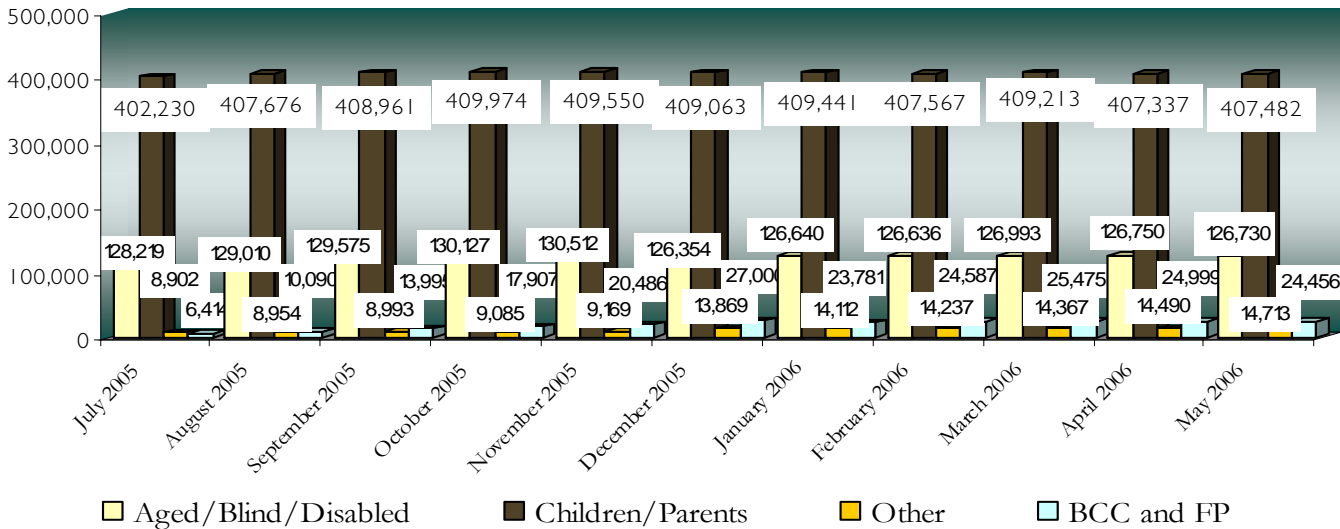
SCHIP Breakdown of Total Enrollment

Focus on Child Health

Highlights of OHCA’s Child Health Unit Activities

Child Health staff at OHCA developed and coordinated the mailing of 150,000 fliers to adult SoonerCare members in March and April 2006. The flier promotes the 1-800-QUIT NOW service that is also known as the Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline. In addition to reporting an increased volume of calls since the mailing, the Helpline estimates:

- Prior to the mailing, about 10 percent of calls each month were reported to be from SoonerCare members;
- In March, 31 percent of calls were reported to be from SoonerCare members;
- In April, 40 percent of calls were reported to be from SoonerCare members.

The Child Health Unit also placed 496 outbound calls January through March 2006 to mothers of newborn babies between the ages of four to six weeks. The group to be called was selected through a random process. Receptivity to the calls was good as the parents are congratulated on the birth of the baby, educated on the services that SoonerCare offers and advised that SoonerCare representatives are available for them to speak with as questions arise. The Child Health representative explains the SoonerPlan program in this conversation and the parents have shown interest in the information shared.

The Perinatal Task Force, spearheaded by the Child Health Unit, scheduled a series of “Asking Conferences” around the state to solicit community input on perinatal health issues. Co-sponsors for the community meetings were the Oklahoma State Department of Health and the Healthy Mothers Healthy Babies Coalition. Six community meetings were held during the March through May 2006 period. Information received at the meetings will be used to explore means of improving the state perinatal system for all pregnant women. The work of the Task Force has been an ongoing project since May 2005.
